from his jewelry store, he spoke
with enthusiasm about his many
projects and how he first got
involved in working with young

"It started in high school," he said, "I grew up in Huntington Woods, in the Berkley School System. In 1971-72, an elementary school had slow students who needed mentoring. A teach-

er volunteered her services and Astrein also was asked to help out, during his lunch and study break.

"We bonded really well," he said, referring to how he and the students get along. "I had so much enjoyment."

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After high school, he went to Michigan State University, where he got a bachelor of arts degree. Right after graduation, he began working with his younger involves, Cary, who had started a jewelry and gift atore called What's Upstairs in down Birmingham, Later, they decided to just have a jewelry store and opened Astrein's. Gary is a Birmingham resident, and Astrein lives in Huntington Woods.
"I got active in community events regarding the Birmingham Bloomfield Chamber of Commerce," he recalled. "I joined the Birmingham Kiwanis and worked with seniors citizens and the Birmingham Area Sonior Coordinating Council, and also the Birmingham Yullage Players."

He said that Kiwanis is an Indian word for 'We serve.' I thought that was really nice. We were doing well in the business, but I wanted to give something back to the community."

The Kiwanis did a benefit for Sanctuary, in Royal Oak, the only shelter for runaways (ages 7-17) in Oakland County. When he visited the shelter, it was really an eye-opener, hearing how the kids talked about their dysfunctional families.

His away life experience had

His own life experience had been much different. "I grew up in a very solld home situation," he said. The kids' negative comments revealed, "There's a whole world out there I was never part of. It was heartbreaking."

Getting together with the
youngsters at the Sanctuary is
important. "Sometimes it's just
dialogue. I try to get on their
level. It opens up so much
more," he said.

Astrein has become one of the
Sanctuary's most active workers.
He served as president for the
last three years. "We had a zoo
event last year with families. It
was quite successful," he said.

In 1997, the Sanctuary merged with Common Ground, also in Royal Oak, which has long served Oakland County families and teens to adults.

He added, "We also have a close relationship with Variety, The Children's Charity. Variety has done a lot for the Sanetuary." It gave the shelter free coaches, through the Sunshine Coaches program, to be used for group outlings.

As president of the Birming-ham-Bloomfield Chamber of Commerce, he also is involved in the chamber's annual benefit, "A Winter's Fantasy" for Variety. "The funds stay in the community," he pointed out. He also heads up the chamber's Fall Spectacular fashion event, which benefits Beaumont Hospital Pediatries, through scholarships for kids with cancer.

His jewelry shop often provides gifts for community events, such as the raffle when Seahold and Groves have overnight parties at graduation time. A scrapbook at the store shows some of the participation. "We generally lend a helping hand. That's part of the community," he said.
