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was to try and score 100 points," said Baker, who also won an Observerland championship while attending Salem in 1981. "We figured we could score 109 and we surpassed that goal. Our seniors stepped up, big; we rode our horses tonight."

Kingallen joined Seary on the sprint medley and 1,600 relays and anchored the 800 relay,

which also took first. "Winning the sprint relays was especially gratifying for the Salem sprinters, Kingallen said. "We kept getting dogged by our distance runners, saying we never win anything," Kingallen said. "We had to get first to show them who's boss."

Briggs ran second on the winning distance medley relay and

also led off the winning 6,400 and 3,200 relays. The 6,400 team ran a school-record time of 18:30.9.

Churchill, an eight-time champion, had his best finish in years. The Chargers had a pair of first-place finishes and a tie for first to go with one second.

Ryan Kearney won the open 110 hurdles in a school-record 14.1 seconds, and he also led off the winning shuttle hurdle relay team. The pole vault team tied Farmington Harrison for first with a combined jump of 32-6.

"I'm elated and surprised, but the kids work so hard anything is possible," Churchill coach Rick Austin said. "They made it happen tonight."

North Farmington's Raiders, who hasn't won an Observerland Relay, were ecstatic about taking third. The Raiders had 22 points in the field events, winning the shot put relay, and had three third-place finishes.

North may have finished higher if it could have fielded a high jump or shuttle hurdle relay.

"We came to compete, didn't expect anything," North coach Todd Schultz said. "We're big time excited. It's a great meet with tough teams. We're happy we were successful enough to take third."

Detroit Catholic Central, expected to make a bid for one of the top three places, tied for eighth place with Westland John Glenn with 31 points.

The Shamrocks were without eight performers, including standouts Joe Hubert, David Popeljo and Nick Brzezinski. Coach Tony Magni didn't let the eight compete, because they

were out the night before at Livonia Ladywood's prom.

Had it been CC's prom, the eight could have competed, Magni said.

The Shamrocks managed a fourth-place finish in the shuttle hurdle relay despite a wipeout of Don Slankster, one of CC's seniors.

"Our kids have two proms to go to, and I say pick the one that doesn't have the race after it," Magni said. "I've been doing it 30 years, and I'm not going to change now. We weren't going to win it, but with Salem here, but we would have been much better. Salem is very, very good."

"The kids we had here today were excellent. I'm very impressed with Slankster. How many kids get knocked over the last hurdle and just stay there? He finished."

Defending champion Harrison got strong with 23 points in the field events, including a first place in the long jump. But the Hawks, without sprinter Jerrard Johnson, managed no firsts and only one second in the running events.

Glenn, the 1995 champion and 1996 co-champion, struggled with Harden James not at full strength. James pulled out after failing to finish the preliminaries of the open 100 meters.

"That changed our 400 and 800 relays," Glenn coach Jess Shough said. "The kids who ran real hard."

Northville set a meet record in the 400 relay as Jon Clemens, Chris Seary, Geno Peters and Tony Clemens finished in 43.6.

Proposed Flood Elevation Determinations for
The City of Farmington Hills
Oakland County, Michigan

AGENCY: Federal Emergency Management Agency
ACTION: Proposed rule.
SUMMARY:
Technical information or concerns are solicited on the proposed modified basic (1% annual chance) flood elevations shown on your community's preliminary Revised Flood Insurance Rate Map. These base flood elevations are the basis for the floodplain management measures that the community is required to either adopt or show evidence of being already in effect in order to qualify or remain qualified for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The proposed base flood elevations modify the base flood elevations shown on your community's presently effective Flood Insurance Rate Map.

DATES:
The period for comment will be ninety (90) days following the second publication of this proposed rule in a newspaper of local circulation in the community.

Preliminary Revised Flood Insurance Rate Maps showing the proposed modified base flood elevations and their delineations are available for review at the Farmington Hills City Engineering Department, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:
The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determination of modified base flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-284), 87 Stat. 1080, which added Section 103 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-498), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 67.4 (a).

"These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum standards that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, on persuasion of policies established by other Federal, State or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents."

Pursuant to the provisions of 6 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination of a substantial number of small entities is a flood elevation determination that would require a substantial number of small entities to incur substantial costs to comply with the floodplain management measures. If adopted by a local community, it will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accordance with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local action. It imposes no new requirements of itself if it has no economic impact.

Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the Preliminary Revised Flood Insurance Rate Map. Lessees and owners of real property in the City of Farmington Hills, are encouraged to review these maps and related materials at the address cited above. The proposed base flood elevations are as follows:

Spring Is Here and the Fleas are jumping

No matter how clean your pet is, they are susceptible to fleas. Fleas are small wingless insects that feed on the blood of your pets. The problems that are caused by fleas are related to an allergic reaction that many animals have to flea bites. One bite is often enough to cause severe itching resulting in damage to the skin and secondary infections.

Any pet that is seen scratching frequently should be checked for fleas which can generally be found at the base of the tail. Often only the small dark specks of flea excrement can be found indicating a flea infestation.

The entire life cycle may be as short as two weeks in which ten adult fleas can reproduce into over 100,000. The best control is prevention using one

of the newer products that are applied monthly. These products will kill fleas before they can bite your pet.
