

Raiders erupt for 17-7 win; Cornwell paces Hawks

North Farmington came roaring back Wednesday after dropping Livonia Franklin a 7-0 lead to win 17-7 in baseball.

The host Raiders (10-2) got four runs back in the bottom of the third inning and added a single run in the fourth. A 10-run fifth put North ahead, 16-7.

Mike Gleeson, Tom Ouellette, Jeff Trzos and Kirk Taylor had two hits each as the Raiders pounded Franklin pitching for a total of 13.

BASEBALL

Trzos had an RBI single and a sixth-inning solo homer that was "one of the longest home runs I've ever seen at North Farmington," coach Iv Horwitz said.

Trzos not only cleared the right-center field fence but also a row of trees and a line of electrical wires to land in a neighboring backyard.

"It traveled a good 430 feet,"

Horwitz said. "If our fence is accurate at 390, it had to go another 40 feet past that."

With the Raiders needing one more run in the sixth to invoke the mercy rule, junior Matt Lash, who was 0-for-4 this season, made his first hit as a varsity player a home run to end the game.

Garry Penta knocked in three runs with a bases-loaded double, and Mike Barnett hit a two-run double. Taylor and Matt Kelm-

gian also counted doubles among their hits.

Taylor had three RBI, Kelmigian two, Gleeson and Ouellette one each. Gleeson also scored three runs.

Jason Melvin made his season pitching debut for North, but the win went to Penta in relief. Penta pitched one-hit ball over the last three innings, striking out four and walking one. Jamie Proffer was the starter and loser. Franklin's Tom Jones went 3-

for-3 with a double, a home run and three RBI.

HARRISON 16, GLENN 6: Zack Woodruff led the Hawks to a victory over host John Glenn.

"It was an important win," Harrison coach John Harrington said, "because we lost to Western last to (Plymouth) Salem. If we're able to win our remaining league games, we'll win our division."

Harrison and Western are tied for first place in the Western Division

with 6-1 records.

The Hawks (12-3) took control of the game early by scoring six runs in the first inning. Harrison added two runs in the second and one in the third for a commanding, 9-0 lead.

Zach Burton, a junior right hander, was the beneficiary of all the run support. He went the distance, allowing just two earned runs and five hits while striking out eight.

Junior Blake Bosky had three hits and four RBI; Andy Gutierrez had three hits and three RBI.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING
TO REVIEW THE 1998-99 PROPOSED BUDGET

The City Council of the City of Farmington will hold a public hearing at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, June 1, 1998, in the Council Chambers in City Hall, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48335 on the proposed 1998-99 budget. The property tax millage rate proposed to be levied to support the proposed budget will be a subject of this hearing.

The 1999 proposed property tax levy includes 11.094 mills (\$11.094 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for City operations and charter limited debt service, 2.468 mills (\$2.468 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for unlimited debt service, and 1.600 mills for road improvements, including debt service, for a total millage rate of 15.162 mills (\$15.16 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value).

The recommended 1998-99 budget reflects increasing costs of delivering City services. Employee salaries and fringe benefits, goods and services purchased by the City and financing of the library and court systems, is a major part of the General Fund operating expenditures for 1998-99.

Public comments, oral or written, are welcome at the hearing on the proposed budget for FY 1998-99 and the proposed property tax millage rate.

The proposed budget, as summarized below, will be on file in the office of the City Manager for public inspection.

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Shamrocks take 2 from Warriors

Birmingham Brother Rice pitching ace Tom Marx outshined Detroit Catholic Central's ace Tony Nozowski at the plate but certainly not on the mound when their two teams met in a Wednesday doubleheader at CC.

Marx, a senior left-hander expected to go high in next month's Major League draft, hit a home run in the first game only to lose to his counterpart, 4-3. The Shamrocks completed the sweep with a 2-1 victory in the second game.

Both wins came when CC scored runs in its last at-bat.

The Shamrocks (14-4, 10-4) needed at least one win in a Saturday doubleheader against Warren DeLaSalle to clinch first place in the Central Division.

The first round of the Catholic League playoffs will be played Saturday in Utica.

Nozowski (6-0) pitched a complete game, allowing four hits and six walks. He fanned 10.

Nozowski, who carries a 1.27 earned run average, is 10-1 the last two years.

His fastball is his best pitch, but he doesn't throw harder than 80 miles per hour, coach John Salter said.

"He seems to be able to get out of trouble; that's what his strength is," Salter said. "He's not overpowering, but he's good in the clutch."

Marx, who was idle the previous two weeks because of a leg injury, allowed five hits, walked four and hit four batters.

Marx gave Rice a 1-0 lead with a home run in the first inning.

Chris Woodruff, the CC catcher, figured in all of his team's complete games, finishing with two hits and three RBI.

The Shamrocks tied the score with a run in the bottom of the second. Following walks to Chris Woodruff and Anthony Tomey and consecutive steals, Mario D'Erin picked up an RBI with a fielder's choice.

BASEBALL

Rice added two unearned runs in the fifth to take a 3-1 lead, thanks to one hit, two walks and two CC errors.

The Shamrocks pulled within one in the bottom of the fifth when Woodruff doubled to score Matt Firlik, who led off the inning with a double. CC scored twice in the bottom of the seventh to secure the victory with help from a passed ball.

Dave Lusky started the rally, reaching first base despite striking out, because the second strike got past the Rice catcher and went to the backstop.

Marx then hit Casey Rogowski with a pitch, putting runners on first and second. Woodruff followed with a double to bring both home for the one-run win.

Woodruff is hitting .385 with 18 RBI, which ranks third on the team behind Rogowski (26) and Lusky (23). He leads the Shamrocks with seven doubles.

"He's been a good, consistent clutch hitter and has improved defensively," Salter said. "We know he could hit. He hit pretty well last year on the varsity."

The Shamrocks eked out another one-run win in the nightcap, breaking a 1-1 tie with a run in the bottom of the seventh.

Adam Harris started things with a single and was sacrificed to second on a bunt by Firlik. A walk to Lusky put runners on first and second, and Rogowski followed with an RBI single to score Firlik with one out.

Tomey (3-1), throwing five innings in relief of starter Mike Haller, earned the pitching win.

Rice scored its only run in the first. The Shamrocks tied the score with a run in the bottom half. Lusky and Woodruff singled to put runners on first and third. Tomey followed with an RBI single.


