The City Council of the City of Farmington will hold a public hearing at 8:00 p.m. on Munday, June 1, 1998, in the Council Chambers in City Hell, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48:335 on the proposed 1993-99 budget. The property tax millage rate proposed to be levied to support the proposed budget will be a subject of this hearing.

The 1999 proposed property tax levy includes 11.094 mills (\$11.094 per \$1.000 of Taxable Value) for City operations and charter limited debt service, 2.466 mills (\$2,466 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value) for unlimited debt service, and 1.60 mills for road improvements, including debt service, for a total millage rate of 16.16 mills (\$16.16 per \$1,000 of Taxable Value).

The recommended 1998-99 budget reflects increasing costs of delivering City services, Employee salaries and fringe benefits, goods and services purchased by the City, and financing of the bibrary and court systems, is a major part of the General Fund operating expenditures for 1998-99.
