State Senate unanimous in its vote to ban cloning

Senate Bill 864, part of the package to prohibit human cloning, was passed unanimously, 37-0, by the Senate, but only after a briof floor fight on whether to sunset the law. Sen. John Schwarz, R-Battle Creck, offered an amendment to let the bill expire in five years. It was rejected 13-23. Here is how area senators voted on the amendment.

The bills provide for heavy fines and loss of licenses for persons who attempt human cloning.

Paul A. Long, of the Michigan Catholic Conference, praised the Senate for "boldly stating that human life is more important that scientific research on the fringe... In our view, Congress should pass a national ban."




