## FARMINGTON IN ATHLETICS

### EXPECT TO MAKE A GOOD SHOWING THIS WINTER

#### Are Strong in Basket Ball and Will Work up on In-Door Base Ball at Once

We were all proud of Farmington's showing in basket ball last season. Our high school team made a very good showing indeed against high school teams in the Bay City, also Wyandotte, Holly, Northville, etc., while our 1st Farmington team went up against the strongest aggregation in the state and made an excellent showing against them, too. We were informed by the manager of the champions, "Macks Parks," that Farmington 1st basket ball team made good a showing in Farmington against them as the team the "Macks Parks" defeated last in the championship series.

Then why can we not have a state championship basket ball team out of Farmington this winter. The coaches of the greatest state teams have told us repeatedly that we have the material if we'd but give them a chance. It would be worth while even from a purely business view point, as an advertisement for the town. It would also be worth while for the training in hardihood, skill, (and in the meeting of emergencies away from home) that it would give our youths.

The public sympathy and public support which the young folks received last winter was most helpful and most gratifying to them, and beyond a doubt the same kind-

ly, public spirit will characterize our citizens this season.

The different athletic organizations of the village, have unanimously consented to secure the mediatory offices of the Farmington Guild in order that there may be a single, responsible and representative body back of athletics this season. Dr. Miller and S. D. Harger, president of Farmington Guild, were appointed by the athletic department of the Guild, a general advisory committee for all athletics of the village.

We have several indoor base ball enthusiasts in our village now and we are to have a team organized for this splendid sport this winter. In time we may develop indoor base ball talent equal to our fast outdoor base ball talent. "What we most need is a ball. Some have suggested building a fine new building. It does seem, however, that we have enough public building in Farmington practically unused and useless to the general welfare of the community. If it would be impossible to secure a suitable hall from our present number, either by purchase outright or by rental then at least one more building would be assured of being kept in good repair and of respectable appearance, not going down to decay to mar the general well kept appearance of our neat little home town of which we are all so justly proud.
