wait until it's too soft! The best buy.

Metalines - Look for those that have plenty of red with some orange-yellow areas in between. The 'seam' on the side of the fruit should have a slight softening, but the skin should never be split or cracked.

Paches - Contrary to what most people believe, the amount of red in a peach is not related to its ripeness. Just be sure the fruit is at least yellow or creamy and not green. The slightly firm ones are the best.

Strawberies - Those that have the most overall red color with firm flesh are the only ones to buy. Make sure they don't have any signs of softness, mold or shrinkage because the decay spreads from berry to berry quickly. Medium to small strawberries usually taste better than larger ones.

**Mwatermelons - Look for smooth surfaces with fully rounded ends. If the melon is cut, check for firm, bright red "ment" with dark seeds. Avoid those with whitish seeds or

stringy flesh. That may mean the melon was picked too soon.

In general, moldy or bruised areas on most fruits mean it may not ripen correctly or at least may have damaged a portion of the fruit.

Now that you know how to choose the beat fruits at the market, how do you store them once you get hom? Most can be left out on your counter at room temperature; others may need a litch help to ripen.

Nectarines, peaches and kiwifruit can be ripened by putting them into a paper bag at room temperature and then refrigerated once ripe.

Apples, grapefruit, honeydew melon, oranges, strawberries and watermelons last longer some for weeks – in the refrigerator once they've ripened. Oranges, however, are the judicist when stored at room temperature as long as they're not out for more than a week or two.

At the other extreme, strawberries only last a few days before mold sets in. Keep berries dry and wash only just before

you eat them. This same rule applies to grapes.

Bananas and cantaloupes are best left out at room temperature. The longer cantaloupes sit out, in fact, the juicier and more succulent they become.

If your bananas become too ripe for your taste, peel and freeze them for a batch of banana bread and freeze them for a batch of stored in the refrigerator if it's not going to be eaten right away. Now don't delay! Get to the market and start enjoying the marvelous array of flavors.
