dents taking the Michigan Educational Assessment Program test.

She is a proponent of enrichment, "choice" opportunities where students can pick and choose areas of study they are not considered as a very successful model for metiyating students.

'I think we're shortchanging them if we don't stimulate and challenge these kids," Jaske said. "If we get the enrich-

ments, that would help a let for those kids who want to be challenged more.

If elected, Jaske said she would be a stickler for financial accountability, particularly dealing with the completion of bond issue projects, 'to make sure everything is in compliance and all the objectives for the bend are upheld.'

Jaske also touted the return of 100 percent of \$9.5 million in Durant lawsuit money to residents. The school board last

week voted to give back about 81 percent of it (\$7.7 million) by way of reducing the amount of Series 2 bonds to be issued in mid-1899.

Another objective would be working to either climinate students taking the high school MEAP or moving the tinning of the test.

This spring, most high school juniors in the district opted out of the test, partly because it competed for time with other more-proven tests such as the

ACT and SAT.

"I don't think the high school MEAP test is necessary at all," dasks said. "The kids take enough tests as it is when they become juniors and seniors.

Besides, Jasko said she doesn't really know what the test is measuring, either at the high school level or at the elementary and middle school levels.
"It's more directed on how they should take a multiple question test and I don't know if it's really testing any skills."
