Mother's cancer battle inspires Mercy grad to search for cure

Christine Minghine always loved the sciences.
But it wasn't until her mother, Patti, developed a fast-growing form of breast cancer and died 17 months ago at the age of 48 that her life goals jelled into the study of genetic engineering.
The Livonia resident, who graduated from Farmington Hills Mercy High School in the top 10 percent of her class last month, said her mother's illness has prompted her to do something with her life to help others.
"I don't want any more people to have to go through this," she said. "I want my life to actually have an impact."

She plans to attend the Indiana University for her undergraduate studies in biology, then follow up by attending graduate school to study genetics. These degrees will set her up to work in genetic engineering.
This July, she will attend the non-profit 1998 National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine in San Francisco where she will be among 350 outstanding high school juniors and seniors from across America participating. She was selected because of her outstanding academic achievements and her interest in the

profession of medicine.

She will mentor at medical institutions and learn from prominent leaders in the medical community. Some of the topics scheduled for the session include. scheduled for the session include breakthroughs in genetic research, cancer research, AIDS, sports medicine, neonatal and pediatric research, computers in the world of medicine, public health, clinical decision-making and biochics.

I'm kind of akeptical," she
said. "My mom was on the list to
try some of these drugs, and did
use some. She was one of the
rare cases — it didn't help

Dad Ernie Minghine, deputy
superintendent with the Westwood school district, is particularly proud of his youngest
daughter and her focus.

"This is why she decided to go
this program and study," he
said. "I'm vory proud of my
daughter—and my wife. She's a
very special young lady.

She's carried herself through
her final years of high school
with a solid goal "despite the fact
that she lost her mother—her
best friend," he added.

During her teen years, Christi-

na has played field hockey and soccer and also danced ballet and jazz. She also enjoys reading and ceramics — even making a bust of her mom as a project. The Minghine family has lived in Livonia for many years. Patti, a Redford native, taught junior high school science in the Taylor schools.

Christina has one sister Tricia, 23, who still lives in the area, and a brother Mike, 20, who attends Sienna Heights Collego. The family apent many years traveling, visiting just about every state together.

Christina said her mother never let her illness affect rour

never let her illness affect rou-tines, such as annual family trips to Florida. She continued to

trips to Florida. She continued to travel, even though she was ill.

Those special memories keep her morn with her, as Christina ends her high school career and moves onto college. The young graduate said she doesn't focus on the cancer risk in her family, but stuys informed about it.

"I don't dwell on it," she said. "But if I did (get cancer), I would be sure to handle it like.my mom. She handled her illnesswith grace and dignity and

mom. She handled her illness with grace and dignity and strength. She handled that like she handled everything else in life.

"I never say cancer defeated her — it didn't."
