3 elected to C'ville school board

In the Clarenceville School District, school board trustee Gary Garrison, a newcomer just four years ago, now finds himself the most senior member of the board after winning re-election in Monday's school election. Newcomer John Shaw and incumbent Garrison both won four-year torms. Newcomer Bryan Bentley won an open two-year torm.

Byan Bentley won an open twoyear term.

In the race for the four-year
term, Shaw was the top vote getter, with 145 votes followed by
Garrison who garnered 132
votes. Brian Silvernai came in
third, with 62.

With 133 votes, Bentley beat
Crystal Waack's 82 votes to win
a two-year term on the
Clarenceville school board.

small Oakland County district, which serves parts of Livonia, Redford Township and Farming-ton Hills, were not immediately available.

Absentee ballots tip WL board vote

Before the results came in, Michael Knrsen had a feeling absentee votors would determine who was elected to the Walled Lake school board.

He was right.
With a voter turnout of only 2.5 percent in the district race for two four-year terms, absentee votes made up a 41 percent of the ballots cast. And 415 of the 5898 absentee votes supported Karsen for one of the terms.

The West Bloomfield resident will take his seat on the board July 1 and board vice president Thomas McConnell will return for another term.

Randolph Ston, appointed to be board a year ago, was causted by 90 votes. McConnell took 1,031 and Karson received 820. Candidates and school officials were disappointed with the turnout of only 1,447 people out of 67,000 registered voters. The district includes the northwest corner of Farmington Hills. I think typically if there isn't a financial issue on the ballot people feel it isn't worth their time, said James Geisler, super-intendent.

Oakley Park Elementary, precinct eight, was a karate class which moved its lesson out on the front lawn to make way for voting machines in the school gym. About 73 voters turned out

"There was nobedy there," McConnell said of the different polls he visited Monday.

Karson suggested the district post election signs outside the polling places to raise awareness in future elections.

"It's a shame that people don't know about the election," Karson said.

All three candidates and their wives congratulated each other after the votes were tallied shortly before 9 p.m. Monday in the district board room occupied by less than 20 school officials and supporters.

Ston, who received more votes than Karson in seven of the 10 precincts, wasn't sure why absentees were over-whelmingly cast in Karson's favor. "It could be as simple as I have a short name and I think I was third on the balle."

Ston said candidates really need to get the word out earlier.

than in past years since more voters in recent years are casting absente ballots.

"In very surprised," Karson said of his election. "I'm also very excited. I'm looking forward to representing everyone in the district."

All three candidates posted signs in the district, but McConnell noted his extra changing in old – candy mints covered by re-elect McConnell wrappers.



"I think, at this point, I need to be brought up to date on all the issues," Karson said.


"I'm going to relish the moment for a while, then I'll sit back and decide the direction I'm going to go," McConnell said.
