a the interurban trolley comes to a halt at Farmington junction, passengers and argo unload. Some transfer north to picnic at Orchard Lake, while others with packages are destined for Northville and beyond. That's the way it was until 1928. By then, the interurban line was no longer needed. The tracks were removed. Automobiles, municipally owned busses, jitneys, steam trains and streeteers had taken over urban transportation in Southeast Michigan.




