Names which have some relevance to peregrines and their characteristics are preferred. Names do not have to be gender-

The word "peregrine" mean wander, and these falcons migrate great distances each year. Peregrines are one of the most admired hirds of prey as well as one of the top predators. An endangered bird, peregrines are powerful hunters and prey on other birds. When they dive, or "stoop," for prey they can reach speeds of up to 200 miles per hour.
