Mercy music man ends on high note

Larry Teevens steps down as Mercy High School's music director after a 37-year career with many highlights.

Larry Teevens came to Mercy High School to start a music program and figured hold stay at year.

"Who would stay at year?" asked Teevens, who came to the Farmington Hills school after a stint as choral director for the city of Detroit.

Thirty-soven years later, Teevens, now 65, is retiring from Mercy this month. As director of the music program for almost four decades, he has worked with countless students and four principals.
"I enjoyed the students here so much, the family atmosphere," he said. You become attached, involved with the young ones. It's a lovely trap."
The principal, Sister Regina Doelker, called Teevens "Mercy's music man."
She has known him for 23 years, the first 11 as a fellow tencher and the remaining 12 as principal.

"He certainly has done a marvelous piece of work with music and getting into the community to groups that need cheering," she said. "It's more than music. He's helped develop the spiritual lives of the girls."

A Dotroit native, Teevens has enjoyed a lifelong dedication to his craft. As a youth he sang with the WXYZ Detroit Radio Schoolhouse program in the old Broadway Theatre, now the Detroit Opera House. He also performed with the Make Way for Youth radio program on WIR-AM.

He looks forward to joining a chorus and not having to worry about selling tickets, setting up risers in the auditorium and all the other details that fall under the responsibility of the music director.

One thing he won't give up is his direction of the famed Mercyaires, a group of 20 select junior and senior choral students who make up to 50 public appearances each year in nursing homes and other places "where there's no money for an entertainment budget."

"I like the quote: 'A society can be judged at any time by the treatment of the least of its members.' The kids here learn this."

The Mercyaires were "born of necessity, My choral groups were so large, the smallest was over 100 students." Girls who are interested in becoming Mercyaires audition sophomore year and must carry a high grade point average because many of the engagements occur during regular school hours.




