

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

The following are police and fire incidents that occurred in Farmington and Farmington Hills during the past week.

TIRELESS

In Farmington Hills: Someone stole four tires worth \$400 from a trailer in the U-Haul lot on Grand River between June 11-12. In another incident, someone jacked up a 1992 Lexus and stole all four tires while it was parked at Windemere Apartments between June 12-15.

WHAT A PAIN

In Farmington Hills: Someone stole 25 ampules of the pain medication Demerol worth \$200 from the Michigan Neurological Institute on Orchard Lake between May 23-26.

ATTEMPTED AUTO THEFT

In Farmington Hills: A car thief cut the top and damaged the steering column but didn't drive away with a 1996 Mustang Convertible parked at Nantuckette Town Homes between June 6-8, causing more than \$100 damage. The owner believes an anti-theft device on the car thwarted the thief.

CAR FIRE

In Farmington Hills: Police put out a fire coming from under the dash board of a

1987 Mercury Marquis parked at the United Artist Theatre on Grand River and Tuck at 1:30 p.m. June 12. Damage is estimated at \$1,200.

VANDALISM

In Farmington Hills: Someone shot out the windshield of a 1996 Chevy Cutaway parked at Electromatic on Industrial Park Court on June 12, causing \$900 damage.

A vandal threw two cantaloupe-sized rocks through the front window of an Oakpointe residence about 11:30 p.m. June 12, causing more than \$200 damage.

MARIJUANA SMOKERS

In Farmington Hills: Police came across a man laying on a chaise longue and smoking marijuana from a pipe on Chapelweigh on June 12. The man appeared startled and then tried to cup the pipe in his hand. Police confiscated the pipe and gave the man, a 21-year-old student, a ticket for marijuana possession.

Police ticketed a 17-year-old Redford male after finding 3.2 grams of marijuana on the floorboard of a 1988 Pontiac on 10 Mile Road on June 13.

BURGLARY

In Farmington Hills: Burglars robbed a resident of a

microwave oven and dinette set after breaking into his apartment at Independence Green the night of June 11-12. There were no signs of forced entry.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills: Police arrested a Farmington Hills woman, 35, for her second drunken driving offense, this one near Woodland Hills Park on Farmington Road about 10 p.m. June 12. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .17 percent, which is above the legal limit of .10 percent. She was also ticketed for driving on a suspended license.

Police arrested a Wixom man, 28, for drunken driving on Orchard Lake near 13 Mile at 1:30 a.m. June 13. Police stopped the 1995 Chevy after it was seen weaving. The driver, who said he drank two beers at a Livonia nightclub, had a blood alcohol level of .11 percent.

In Farmington:

Police arrested a 62-year-old Detroit man for drunken driving after a traffic stop about 1:20 a.m. Saturday. The man was driving his car at a high rate of speed on eastbound Grand River, near Brookline, when officers stopped him. The driver struggled with field sobriety tests, and registered a blood alcohol level of .24 percent. During a search of his vehicle, police found a half-empty bottle of brandy and a plastic cup. A wet spot was found near the cup.

Police arrested a 34-year-old Farmington Hills man for drunk driving about 1:50 a.m. Sunday near Grand River and Nine Mile Road. According to police reports, the driver was trying to remove his car from a parking block. Officers noted alcohol on his breath and subsequently conducted field sobriety tests. The driver registered a blood alcohol level of about .16 percent.

PEEPING TOM

In Farmington Hills: Police ticketed a Hills man, 26, after he was seen looking into the bedroom window of a couple having sex at Little Valley Trail-

er park on Tuck Road around 10:30 p.m. June 12. The couple saw the man run back into his trailer and called police. The man admitted being near the trailer but denied peeping.

WATERCRAFT STOLEN

In Farmington Hills: Someone stole a \$5,000 1993 Bombardier Waverunner and a \$1,000 boat trailer from the front lawn of a Bunkerhill address the night of June 12-13.

DOPE BAG

In Farmington Hills: A host of a graduation party found a duffel bag containing hallucinogenic mushrooms, liquid acid and blotter paper in the backyard of the Flanders Street residence June 14. The man who was seen toting the dope-filled duffel ran when police arrived to break up the party. Later, a man called the home to find out if the bag had been found. The person said yes, but it was being turned over to police. The man hung up.

A flashlight and a screwdriver also were found on the floorboard.

In Farmington Hills: A culprit stole a cellular phone after breaking a driver's side window on a 1997 Pontiac Grand Am parked at Kendallwood Apartments the night of June 14-15.

GUN SHOTS

In Farmington Hills: Police ticketed a Dearborn Heights man, 16, after he was seen shooting a .22 caliber rifle from the back of a Spring Valley residence June 15. Police heard the shots and then saw the man sitting in a chair firing at a can 50 feet away. A neighbor said she thought it was firecrackers but heard something hit her roof.

STUDENT REVENGE?

In Farmington Hills: Vandals egged a house and then threw oil on the door and porch of a Piper Lane Court residence about 10 p.m. June 15, causing \$1,000 damage. A teacher from Birmingham Seaholm High School lives at the home and received a threatening phone call last week, stating "It's payback time bitch."

Teen suffers head injuries from jump out of moving van

A Southfield teen is expected to recover from head injuries she sustained after she suddenly jumped from a moving van at a Farmington Hills shopping center Saturday.

Farmington Hills paramedics took the 17-year-old girl, Stephanie Claro Vanhooy, to Botsford Hospital where she was being treated for a possible closed head injury. She was expected to be released Tuesday, a family member said.

"She's getting much better," said Christina Vanhooy, 14, the girl's sister.

At 2:15 p.m. police were called to Wayne Betts Quality Cleaners

in the Target Center on Grand River on the report of an injured girl.

The girl's mother told police she and her daughter were arguing in the Target Center parking lot when the girl said, "I guess that's my fault too," and opened the van's door and jumped. The van was traveling 20 to 25 miles an hour, police reports said.

The girl's head hit the pavement, a witness said.

Police found the girl lying on the ground bleeding from the head and applied pressure to the wound until paramedics arrived. Parents told police that the girl's behavior was uncharacteristic.
