Interlochen Arts Camp, established in 1928, is the nation's oldest and summer arts program.
It offers intensive training in dance, theater arts, music, creative writing and visual art. The campers, ages eight to 18, attend the programs for eight weeks. The camp attracts its 2,000 students from all 50 states and 29 other countries.
This summer, more than 500 events are presented at the camp by students, faculty, staff and guest artists such as comedian Bill Cosby, world-renowned violinist Itzhak Perlman, Ohio Ballet, Chicago and cellist Yo-Yo Ma.
Recently, Interlochen was named one of the top 25 camps in the nation, according to Family Life magazine.
