Nathan Power, Arthur's son, was Farmington's first schoolteacher.
Farmington is named for Farmington, N.Y., the community from which our first residents came.
D'anckel Middle School is named after the superintendent of Farmington Schools (1939-43, 1946-56). G.V. Harrison followed Dunckel.
Shinwasses Etrect used to be called Detroit Road and was built as a millitary road connecting Detroit and central Michigan.
Warren (Rex) Cawley, a graduate of Farmington High School, won an Olympic Gold Medal at the Tokyo Games in 1964. He ran the 400 cates hurdles

Fred Warner, Michigan governor from 1904-1910 and a Farming-ton native, was adopted. The Botsford Inn, one of the oldest inns in Michigan, dates back to

1941.

The first woman to be buried in Farmington was Mrs. Sanford Utley, According to legend, she died from a head wound that she received when she fell off the wagon upon arrival to her property on 12 Mile near Middlebelt Road.

The North Farmington Cemetery, on Farmington Road north of 13 Mile, is the burial site for a soldier from each of America's major wars: the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, Mexican War, Civil

War, Spanish American War, Word Wars I and II and the Korean and Vietnam wars.

The first newspaper in Farmington was called the Enterprise and
was first published on Nov. 2, 1888.

Farmington's Andrew Jackson Crosby was the first Michigan man
to enlist during the Civil War. After the war, he became a prominent
citizen of the town and died in 1909.

First Lone Ranger

First Lone Ranger
Farmington's Earle Graser was the first radio voice of the Lone
Ranger. He provided that booming "Hi-Yo Silver" for eight years,
heard on 140 radio stations, before dying in an auto accident. His
replacement was Brace Beemer, the best known Ranger voice.
Hero's one that your friend may find hard to believe. During World
War II, Farmington was bombed by the Japanese. In March 1945, a
hydrogen-filled balloon fell in a field on Gill Road. An incendiary
device started a small fire. These balloons were launched by the
Japanese to follow the prevailing winds to America. They then were
supposed to drop and set forest fires in the Pacific Northwest. The
one that fell in Farmington was one that went the farthest. These
balloons were kept a secret by the United States during the war.
