### Metro League drops puck on 1998 schedule

Popularity in certain sports comes and goes. Then there's the Metro Summer Hockey League. Founded by A.J. Baker (now the coach of NCAA Division II national champion University of Alabama-Huntsville), the MSHL is now in its 16th season. In that span, very little has changed in the league's focus or operation:

• Many of the same players will compete again this season—just like last year and the year before.

• All the games will be at the Plymouth Cultural Center's Leaven, again (well, one playeff game was in Dearborn).

• There will again be eight tedjins, with players ranging in age from 15 to 36.

"We get a lot of older guys who are, just trying to stay in shape," said Keith Pictille, the league commissioner. "And we get some younger guys who are trying to learn some things from the younger guys."

Asked about possible expansion, Pictilla and, "We want to keep the quality of the league," Expand too much and you spread out the good players to far."

Each team's roster consists of 17 players, which includes two goulies. The cost of ice rental has gone up, causing a \$10 increase in per-player dues — up to \$175 each. That pays for ice time for 11 regular-season games and at least one playoff game (every term qualifies for the playoffs).

about it. He's not anything flashy, but everyone needs players like that."
Holdridge is about to enter his senier year at CC, where he is an honor roll student.
Among the others ranked by the NHL scouting service are Dustin Kuk, a 6-1, 200-pound left winger from Livonia Churchill who played at the University of Wisconain last easons. Coring ning goals and I sasista (he's ranked 131st); and Joe Blackburn, another Churchill grad who was Michigan State's backup goalie, posting a 2,23 goals against average in limited action behind starter Chad Alban.


