After being disappointed by other matro-area shows, the Farmington Hills teems believed they could do bet-er and decided to organize and stage their own event. The result was the creation of Wolverine Pro Wrestling with the stat-do bjective of restoring Detroit as a hotsed for professional wrestling like it was several decades ago. Shah and Golaszewski got the idea for doing their own independent pro-motions during a phone conversation near December and statted brainstorm-ing.
