Receiving permission from the Detroit Red Wings, the National Hockey League and Warner Brothers, McKimson produced a litho-seriograph of Bugs Bunny wearing a Red. Wings uniform and chasing a hockey huck across the ice.
If there's something familiar looking about his stance, it's because Bugs was drawn to resemble the skating style of Red Wings captain Steve Yzerman.
