Rock band assists HAVEN shelter

A visit this week from the rock band Smashing Pumpkins left the staff and residents of HAVEN criais shelter feeling a little overwhelmed — and extremely grateful.

The internationally-popular band visited the Oakland County shelter Wednesday afternoon, before playing a benefit concert or HAVEN that evening at the State Theatre in Detroit.

Wednesday's concert raised more than \$100,000 for HAVEN, an Oakland County family shelter.

"I can't tell you how grateful HAVEN is," said Pam Berklich, president of the HAVEN board of directors. To have these angelic people come in and donate six figures ... it's very unusual."

It was the fifth concert in a 14-stop tour in which the band is donating 100 percent of ticket sales to different charities — an unusual move in the music

Members of the alternative

rock band said they wanted to visit HAVEN in order to get a chance to meet the people they are helping. During their stop, the band took a tour of the facility, then met with about 30 women and children who are currently staying at the shelter. On jackets were sized, cuestions of the staying at the shelter.

CD jackets were signed, ques-tions were answered - and there were even a few hugs.

Angie Goryl, 22, has been stay-ing at the shelter for two weeks. She showed off a personalized message, on a piece of scrap paper, that singer Billy Corgan wrote for her brother.

"My brother's in the hospital getting chemotherapy right now. He isn't going to believe this," Goryl said, shaking her head in amazement. "He's a huge Smashing Pumpkins fan."

Berklich said the kids especially were "cestatie" about the visit.

Band members Corgan, D'arcy, and James Iha then sat down to answer questions from the media. To protect the shelter's anonymity, the event was not open to the public.

Asked how the idea for the tour was conceived, Corgan said they wanted to do something "radical" this year, to mark their 10th anniversary.

A lot of bands do benefit concerts, he said, but it's unusual to donate 100 percent of ticket sales. It means the band is paying for all expenses, such as facilities, lighting and sound, out of their own pockets.

Corgan said they chose organizations that serve children as a theme, in the hopes it would gain national attention and encourage other people to get involved in charities.

"This way, nationally it will add up to a picture that says, This is what we think is important," Corgan said. "We want it to gain momentum."

While HAVEN's staff felt over-whelmed by the attention, the band members themselves shared some of those feelings.

"Just going to these places, these sites — it's very over-whelming." D'arcy said.
Corgan added: "They idolize us, but these are the real heroes in the world. These people who are willing to put their heart and soul on the line — it's very humbling."

bling." Founded in 1975, HAVEN provides emergency shelter, counseling and therapy for victims of domestic violence and their children, as well as counseling for the abuser and preventative education in schools. It has an annual budget of about \$2.6 million.
