On July 25-31, Eight Mile will undergo a clean up. Businesses and individuals will take part in the event, which nvolves litter pick up, weed pulling and flower planting.

"We encourage businesses to take responsibility for their success by main-taining an attractive facade," said Shar-lan Douglas, Eight Mile Boulevard Association executive president.

The Eight Mile Clean Team" seeks to beautify the 27-mile boulevard that stretches from I-275 on the westside to I-54 on the castside, and beyond.

The event is coordinated by the Eight Mile Boulevard Association, which recently marked its fifth anniversary. The association heriored Farmington Hills City Council member Jon Grant, who served as board chairman.

The association consists of 13 cities that border on Eight Mile botween the major freeways and has grown to include civic organizations, businesses and individuals

Since forming, the association h planted gardens and signs on the median to indentify cities. A marker denotes the boundary Farmington Hills shares with Livonia. Botsford Hospital sponsored the "When we're finished, there will be 18 of these signs where there are city lim-its," Douglas said.

Southeastern Michigan Council of Gov-ornments and Metropolitan Affairs Coalition honored the Eight Mile associa-tion for joint public and private sector partnerships.

The association receives money from individual and business contributors as well as from federal and state grants. Memberships range from \$8 individual to \$1,008 for founder.

"It really is a collaborative effort," Dou-glas said. "We think the results are greater than the sum of the parts."
