

MAEDC Sets Annual Meet Nov. 9

Sen. Lorraine Beebe, Arthur L. Johnson and Ernest Mazy will be guest speakers at the annual meeting of the Michigan Association for Emotionally-Disturbed Children at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 9, in the Howard Johnson Motor Lodge, on West Grand Boulevard, Detroit.

Sen. Beebe, the only woman in the Michigan Senate, is chairman of its health, social services and retirement committee.

Johnson is deputy superintendent of school community relations in the Detroit public schools, and Mazy is executive Michigan director of the American Civil Liberties Union.

Special discussion groups have been set up on three subjects—fee charging in state hospitals, testing disturbed children to special schools and developing additional special education classes.

Those attending the meeting will be asked to choose one of the three discussion groups. After the groups make their recommendations, the three guest speakers will evaluate their ideas.

Pot Luck Dieting Can Be Fun

Here are some of the recipes from the pot-luck.

VEAL SCALLOPINI

1 pound veal, cut in thin slices
1/2 T salt
1 T flour
1/4 c cooking oil
1 6-ounce can button mushrooms
1/2 c chicken broth or white wine
1/4 c chopped parsley

Shake veal in flour and salt. Brown in cooking oil, add mushrooms, broth or wine and parsley. Cook slowly.

LOW-CALORIE FRIED CHICKEN

1 cut-up chicken
1 egg, beaten with 1 T water
1 c potato flakes
Dip chicken parts in egg, then roll in potato flakes. Bake in greased dish at 450 degrees for 3/4 hour.

CUCUMBER AND ORANGE SALAD

1 sliced cucumber
1 sliced onion
1 sliced green pepper
1 c sliced cabbage
2 oranges, sliced and sweetened with Sucaryl
1/2 c vinegar
1/2 c water
Combine cucumber, onion, pepper, cabbage and oranges. Combine vinegar, water and mayonnaise and toss with other ingredients.
