

## OCCEO Elects Fowler

Thomas W. Fowler, Jr., a Pontiac businessman, has been elected chairman of the Oakland County Commission on Economic Opportunity.

Fowler succeeds Carl F. Ingraham, a Birmingham attorney, chairman since March, 1965, who resigned the post because of other commitments.

Fowler was previously vice-chairman of the commission and has been chairman of both the executive committee and the education and youth committee. He joined the commission in February, 1966, as a representative of the Pontiac Urban League.

Mrs. Horace E. Sheldon, of Birmingham, succeeds Fowler as first vice-chairman of the commission. Replacing Sheldon as second vice-chairman is Walter O. Koch, Bloomfield Hills attorney, who was appointed to the commission as representative of Congressman William S. Broomfield, R-18th District.

## Jaycees Begin Search For 1969 Junior Miss

Farmington Area Jaycees have begun their annual search for Farmington's Junior Miss. Open to senior high school coeds of Farmington and Clarenceville School Districts,

contest entry forms may be obtained at any of the area high schools. Deadline for return of entries is Nov. 15. Preliminary judging to choose 12 finalists will be Sunday, Nov. 24.

Jerry Kuhnlein, chairman of the Jaycees, emphasizes that the purpose of the Junior Miss Pageant is to select one teenage girl as representative of all the teenage girls in the country. Kuhnlein said, "The girl chosen is the average teenager, who participates in her high school's activities, is interested in her classes and, in general, is a well-rounded person."

Following the local contest, the winner will participate in a regional pageant to be held in Redford in December. Winner of the regional pageant will move on to the state finals which will be held in Pontiac in January.

The state finalist will participate in the national pageant in Mobile, Ala., in March. The national winner will receive a \$10,000 scholarship.

The national pageant grew out of the famous Azalea Trail Court in Mobile, which was originally intended to honor only Mobile high school senior girls. The event was expanded to include southern states and went on to become a national competition.

The competition is sponsored nationally by local Jaycee chapters. The national finals are hosted by the Mobile Jaycees.

The Ladies Auxiliary to Farmington VFW Post 4033 is conducting a drive for new members.

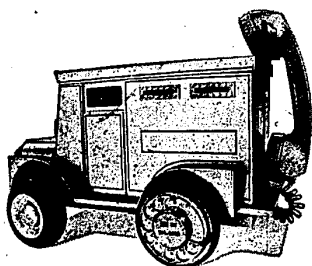

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## Trial Set For Nov. 20

A Farmington Township man has been bound over for Oakland Circuit Court trial on charges of resisting arrest from a Farmington Township police officer.

Leonard C. Cox, 22, of 21737 Wheeler, has been ordered to appear Nov. 20 before Judge William Beers after Justice Court examination Nov. 1, before Township Justice Byron Walter.

He remains free on \$1,000 continued bond.

Charges arose from incidents allegedly occurring when Cox was arrested Oct. 21 by Farmington Township Sergeant Jack Brown.

Brown was injured in a scuffle during the arrest at 20255 Lakster at 10 p.m.

## Sleeping Escapees Arrested

Two Ionia Reformatory escapees were arrested at 10:30 a.m. Monday by Farmington Township police after a four-day watch of one fugitive's township home.

Wayne Langren, 21, of 23151 Tulane, Farmington Township, and Kenneth D. Boudell, 21, of Warren, were held for several hours Monday awaiting state transfer to Ionia.

The pair had escaped Oct. 22 and had spent an undetermined number of days traveling to the Farmington area, police said.

**Halloween Play Low at Schools**  
Farmington district schools suffered no malicious vandalism Halloween night or the night before, according to Harry Sulz, director of buildings and grounds.

Mischief was confined to window soaping and other lesser acts, he said.

The district was patrolled by hired security guards at a reported cost of \$125 per day. The private patrol could be used in the future, he said.

No incidents occurred during the arrest, police said. Township detectives said they had waited until no one was in the house, except the fugitives, who were sleeping.

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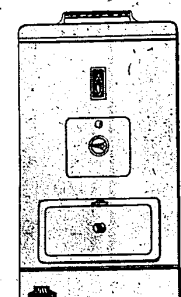
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
