"One day I walked into class and (Harrison) coach (John) Herrington said 'What do you think about Central Michigan' I've got a few connections up there.' I said 'That' be great. "That's fine as long as I'm playing," Cornwell said. "It's the best of the best from all over. I'm just happy I'm in the starting lineup.

"I've made a lot of friends. Know a lot of kids who are going to U-D, Eastern, Wayne and MSU. It'll be fun to see these

guys (when those schools come up on the CMU schedule), because I've been playing baseball with them all summer.

At CMU, Cornwell will room with former Harrison football temmate and "one of my best bude." Tom Salley, and he'll be teammates with former Farmington stars Nick Latra and Eric Pierce.

Cornwell, who also carned All-Observer honors in football, helped the Hawks win the Class A title last November as a two-way starter at fullback and monsterback.

"She's mentally tough enough anticipate the injury will affect


and physically tough enough to rise above any adversity," Perkins said, adding McComb will be a team eccaptain with senior Katie Vilhelic this year.
