the tag on the runner who had tagged up for a double play. "It was right in his mitt on the fly, all the way, about 210 feet," Monterey said. "I sat there and watched the play and after the game looked back and thought how many can make that play at any level? It was a bang-bang play, Timmy blocked the plate, made the catch and the tag at the same time."

Remarkably, Concealed got out of more trouble in the bottom of the seventh after Springfield loaded the bases with no outs. With Pato pitching, Concealed decided to try a trick play, making a phantom throw to second base from pitcher's mound. The play, which is made to look like a ball is thrown while in the field, confused the Springfield runner at second base.

While he got caught in a pickoff between second and third, the shortstop Mike Monterey threw the ball home to tag out the runner from third.

Kalczynski then threw the ball to third base to tag out the runner from second for a double play. A ground ball to Monterey

at shortstop ended the inning without a run being scored. The gimmick play might have been the only way to get out of the inning.

"I'm not sure we feel it's the only way, but it was sure looking grim with the bases loaded and no one out," Monterey said.

Concealed scored two runs in the top of the eighth and Marra kept Springfield scoreless in the bottom of the inning to get the pitching win.

Rigley led off with a single, stole second base and Monterey walked. Following a double steal, Marra slapped a two-run single to put Concealed up 7-5.

Dominic Noonan, a pickup from Garden City, started on the mound and didn't get much defensive support. He walked three, but four errors led to four runs in his 1 2/3 innings of pitching.

Anthony Volpe (Farmington Hills) pitched excellent middle relief, giving up one run on three hits with two strikeouts in 4 1/3 innings.

Rigley was 2-for-4 to lead the hitting attack.

**Semifinals**

Concealed beat Local 32, from Rockford, Ill., 16-5, in a five-inning mercy on Saturday.

Winning pitcher Jason Krug (Redford) went 4 1/3 innings, giving up four runs on five hits and four walks with two strikeouts. Noonan went 4-for-4, including a homer, with three RBI.

Krause went 3-for-4 with two RBI and Marra 3-for-3 with one RBI.

Three others had two hits: Rigley (one RBI), McDaniel (three RBI, including a homer) and Pato (one RBI).

**Friday games**

Concealed beat Local 32 for the first time, 9-3. Pato threw 6 2/3 innings, allowing no runs on five hits and no walks with nine strikeouts.

Monterey was 2-for-3 with three RBI and Marra 1-for-3 with three RBI.

Concealed led 6-3 through six innings and scored three insurance runs in the top of seventh.

**Thursday games**

Concealed beat the Downriver Devil Rays, 14-10, for the first time on Thursday and also beat Novi 9-7 earlier in the day.

The winning pitcher against the Devil Rays was McDaniel, who persevered through 6 1/3 innings, allowing 10 runs on 12 hits and four walks with seven strikeouts.

Downriver hit three homers against McDaniel, who helped his own cause, going 4-5. Krause, Migliceco and Noonan each had two hits. Migliceco, who homered, had two RBI as did Krause and Noonan one RBI.

Against Novi, Concealed overcame a 7-4 deficit early and won behind the relief pitching of Rigley, who allowed

no runs on one hit with three walks and five strikeouts in 3 2/3 innings.

Mama started and left after allowing seven runs, several scoring with the help of six errors. He allowed two hits and walked two.

Monterey worries about Concealed's fielding at times.

"The couple lapses we had could really hurt us against a good team," he said.

McDaniel was 3-for-4 with two RBI and four players had two hits each: Kyle Miller (Farmington Hills), Krause, Pato and Robert Resnick (West Bloomfield).

**Wednesday's game**

Concealed opened the tournament with an 11-2 win over Somberville, Minn. in a five-inning mercy.

Pato was the winning pitcher, allowing no hits and three walks with six strikeouts. The two runs were unearned.

Pato and Migliceco had two-run homers in a five-run first inning.

Migliceco was 3-for-3 with three RBI and McDaniel 3-for-3 with two RBI.

Monterey said the tournament every game is a team effort.

"In all honesty, it was a tournament where everyone on the team played and in some shape or form contributed with a hit or putouts on the field," Monterey said. "It's not often in a regional you can put everyone in the game and have them contribute. In every game it seemed like someone else step up."

McDaniel had multiple hits in every game but one or two, Monterey said.

"He seemed to lead the charges, no question about that," Monterey said.

Brubakers part of Compuware success

If there was a song written about the trophy given to the champion of last weekend's USSSA Tournament in Walled Lake it would have gone something like this:

"We're 16, you're beautiful and you're ours."

Those would have been perfect lyrics for the Compuware 16-under girls fastpitch travel softball team to sing after winning a 19-under tournament at Inter-Lakes Field.

Compuware recorded six wins without a loss to run its record to 37-5 overall. Ironically, the 15 and 16-year-old team beat Compuware's 18-under team in the championship game, 3-2, in 11 innings.

All Land from Clarkston is the head coach and the assistants include Dave Brubaker from North Farmington, Tom Hilkey from Waterford and Frank Copeland from West Bloomfield.

Compuware's 16-under player Melissa Wilson (Lake Orion) was named Most Valuable Player of the tournament.

"We were going in to see better pitching, the best we can," Brubaker said. "We've pretty much beaten everyone in the state at the 16 level. This was a good opportunity to stay close to home and play with some big girls. There were some big girls out there. There was definitely a size difference but talent-wise, we hung with them all."

The team looked at the tournament as a warm-up to the Amateur Softball Association 16-under national tournament that begins next week in Farmington Hills.

"We like to think we can win it but you're talking the cream of the crop coming here," Brubaker said. "There's at least 18 teams coming from California, some from Arizona. Texas is tough, Oklahoma's always got tough teams."

The championship game matching the two Compuware teams was a sell-out through eight innings before each team scored two runs in the ninth using the international tie-breaking system. The rule calls for both teams to start each extra inning with runner on the base who made the last out in the previous innings - on second base.

Emily Cunningham's single with runners on second and third with two outs in the ninth gave Compuware's 18-under team the lead. The 16's battled back with two in its half, scoring on an RBI triple by Jessica Beech (Okemos) and an RBI single by Julie Houck (East Lansing).

Brubaker was the winning pitcher with a six-hitter, striking out six over seven innings.

Beech was 2-for-3 with two RBI. Maria D'Agostino (Walled Lake Western) was 1-for-3 with two RBI and Houck 1-for-2 with an RBI and run scored.

Ballinger also was 1-for-2 with a run scored.
