## THE ITCHY SCRATCHY PET

With this great spring weather, the grass is green and the cottonwoods are fluffing their stuff. Allergy sufferers have runny noses and itchy eyes. Our pets are also affected by allergies.

The most common sign of allergies in our pets is itching. This is seen as scratching and rubbing the ears, eyes, mouth, and chewing areas of the skin until they are raw. Before diagnosing allergies, a pet would need a full physical exam with a complete history. Scratching and itching may be caused by bacterial and fungal infections, parasites, and metabolic imbalances.

Once these other problems are ruled out, allergy testing is often recommended. New testing methods utilize blood samples instead of the skin scratch tests. This is much easier for your pet. Treatment may be as simple as

avoiding certain allergens and taking medications to control allergy symptoms. In most severe cases, the pet may need to be given allergy shots. These shots are made specifically for your pet based on the results of the allergy test.
