His efforts led to the founding of both the Jewish Federation of Metropolitian Detroit and the Round Table of Catholics, Jews

and Protestants, now the National Conference for Community and Justice.

His commitment to ecumeniam classe led him to conduct the first Interdenominational Community Thanksgiving Sorvice while his interest in youth led to the stablishment of the Jewish student organization at the University of Michigou, a foreruner of today's Hillel Foundation.

He was the creator, as well, of the first English language Jewish newspaper in Detroit. There was, it is said, scarcely a social or civic cause to which he did not




