Holdup suspects headed for trial

Testimony about the Aug. 3
armed robbery of the Farmington Hills Denny's Restaurant
and subsequent police chase convinced 47th District Judge Maria
Parker to Unid three suspects
over to Oakland County Circuit
Court for trial.
Parker ordered defendants
Vernon Jemael Adams, 20, of
Southfield, Darrell Holland
Carter, 20, of Lathrup Village,
and Kedar Abdallur York, 21, of
Detroit to stand trial on three
counts each of armed robbery,
which carry potential penalties
of up to life imprisonment.
The judge also denied requests
from defense attorneys for
Carter and York to reduce bond,
because of their relatively free
prior criminal records. Because
of the seriousness of the charges,
bond for each of the defendants
was continued at \$500,000.
Defense attorney Gerald Evel
jvn, who represents Carter, told
Parker that "three defendants
are in three different situations.
My client has a pristine record
up to this point... and the bonds
are lidentical."
Michael McCarthy, the attorney for Adams, identified during
the exam as the getaway driver,
did not make such a request.
Parker said the testimony
heard during the preliminary
examination, primarily from a

apparently was gene. The Volkswagen proceeded on eastbound

Farmington Hills Police Officer Mark Rash was next up on
the stand. He testified that he
began following the Volkswagen
at 1-696 and Inkster Road, after
receiving a dispatcher's call.
Rash detailed a wild chase
from 1-696 to southbound U.S.
10. He told the judge that the car
ho was following the robe point,
drove 40 feet up on a freeway
embankment to avoid a construction sign.

Several times, the Volkswagen attempted to clude Farmington Hills and Southfield police, by pretending to the getting onto exit ramps only to quickly return to the freeway.

"They would do that at each exit." Rash said.

Finally, at U.S. 10 and Evergreen Road, two police cars boxed in the Volkswagen. Rash testified that three men exited the car, and that \$610 in cash—including between \$40-\$100 in \$1 bills — was confiscated from the pants pockels of the driver.

Another "couple hundred" was found in the passenger side door, white police also recovered a gun, bandannas and gloves.

Earlier during the preliminary examination, witnesses detailed the events of that morning.

The armed robbery began about 6:25 a.m. Aug. 3 at the 10 Mile-Grand River Dennys, when three men ent.-red wearing handannas on their faces. They announced a holdup to employees and five customers and displayed a weapon unside a dutile bag.

Employees and customers were bound with duct tape and ordered to lay on the floor in the women's bathroom for 10 minutes. No one was injured.

Defense attorney Otia Culpepper, who represents York, asked Parker to consider reducing bond for his client because of the fact "no one was a was roughed up."

The three defendants are suspects in similar recent incidents in other communities, including Southfield, Lathrup Village and Livonia.
