## WORK BEGUN ON POWER HOUSE

BUILDING WILL BE 32x60 IN SIZE AND TWO STORIES

Pneumatic, or Air Pressure, System Will be Installed. An Eight inch Main on Grand River Ave.

Work was started this week on the new water works building and it will now be pushed forward as fast as possible.

The building is to be 32x50 feet in size and two stories in height. An addition 10x32 one story high will be added. It is to be constructed of cement blocks and will be an addition to the village improvements.

Work will also be started on the mains in a few days. An eight-inch pipe will be laid on Grand River avenue from the west end of the city park to school street and smaller sizes will be used for the

laterals. It is the intention of the council to lay water pipes in every street in the village proper so that universal service can be given.

Although the season is getting late it is said that the work will not be delayed by cold weather, but will be crowded along as fast as possible so that the town can have the much needed water service at the earliest possible moment.

The system which the council has decided to use is known as the pneumatic or air pressure plan. A cement tank 8x36 feet is to be built and will be kept nearly full of water, and then air is forced into the tank on top of the water which will give sufficient pressure on the water in the mains to make it available for fire purposes as well as for sprinkling and domestic uses.

Ray Beach of Millington is in charge of the building operations.

## ELECTRIC CURRENT ON

Stores and Dwellings Being Connected at a Rapid Rate

The current was turned on the new electric light system for the first time Saturday night and all who were prepared and had their business places or houses connected up were given service. Connections are being made daily as fast as the crew of men can do the work and the town already begins to assume a more up-to-date appearance in the evening.

## A FEW CASES OF DIPHTHERIA

SCHOOL AND ALL PUBLIC MEETINGS PROHIBITED

Only Three Cases Reported so Far, Miss Lucie Sprague being the Most Seriously Ill

Conditions seem to have been just right to start a diphtheria epidemic this fall and there are many cases throughout this section of the state.

Although vigorous measures are being taken by the boards of health wherever there are cases reported, it has become necessary in many places to close the schools and also to prohibit public gatherings.

The Northville schools were closed to the lower grades this week and several country districts have also discontinued their schools for the present.

There are three cases reported in the vicinity of Farmington and the school board, by advice of the health officer, promptly closed the village schools rather than take chances of the spread of the dreaded disease.

Further precaution was taken by the board of health in prohibiting public meetings of any kind for the present.

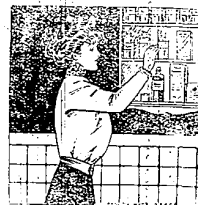
