WORK BEGUN ON **POWER HOUSE**

BUILDING WILL BE 32x60 IN SIZE AND TWO STORIES

Pneumatic, or Air Pressure, Sys tem Will be Installed. An Eight inch Main on Grand River Ave.

Work was started this week on the new water works building and t will now be pushed forward as

The building is to be 32x50 feet in size and two stories in height. An addition 10x32 one story high will be added. It is to be con-structed of cement blocks and will oe au addition to the village im-

Work will also be started on the mains in a few days. An eight-inch pipe will be laid on Grand River avenue from the west end of the city park to school street and smaller sizes will be used for the

laterals. It is the intention of the council to lay water pipes in every street in the village proper so that

universal service can be given.

Although the season is getting late it is said that the work will not be delayed by cold weather but will be crowded along as fast as possible so that the town can have the much needed water service at the earliest possible moment

The system which the council has decided to use is known as the pneumatic or air pressure plan. A cement tank 8x36 feet is to be built and will be kept nearly full of water, and then air is forced into the tank on top of the water which will give spfficient pressure on the water in the mains to make it available for fire purposes as
