

The books will be for sale from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, Sopt. 19, and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, Sopt. 20, at the Birmingham Masonic Temple, 357 North Woodward Avc., Bloomfield Hills, between Quarton and Lone Pino.
Proceeds are used for local scholarships and community projects, with approximately \$15,000 being raised every year.

Jean Walker of Bloom field Hills, chairwomn of this year's sale, said the books donated are good ones.

"We feel we have a very high quality book sale," she said.
Books span every topic with the exception of textbooks older than the 1990s, and Readers Digest condensed books, which are not accepted, ahe said.
Mystories and fiction are always the biggest category and the biggest sellers, Walker said. Many will be offered for \$1.
