# Man accused in stabbing faces additional charges



A 28-year-old man is headed to trial in Oak-land County Circuit Court in connection with the stabbing death of a Farmington Hills man in May. He is also charged with additional counts of auto theft and credit card theft.

The man accused of stabbing a Farmington Hills man to death returned to the apartment – with the victim's body still there – two days after the murder to steal from his former lover, prosecu-

tors said.
Driving Mikhail Ellis' Jeep Chero-kee, James Summerville then drave to a Detroit pawn shop to sell the victim's VCR May 6, prosecuting attorney Mike Bilkovic said in 47th District Court Fri-

day.

Summerville is charged with first-degree murder in the slaying of Ellis,

whose partially decomposed body was found seven days after the killing. Ellis was stabbed 46 times.

Summerville, 28, was bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court after his preliminary exam concluded Friday. Prosecutors added two more counts of auto theft and credit eard theft to the first-degree and felony murder charges. Prosecutors theories Summerville went to the victim's residence and knocked him unconacious with a coramic vass before returning from the kitchen with kitchen knives to stabilim repeatedly. Police found three knives – two of which were broken – at

the scene.

The pair ended a two-year relationship in December 1997 but kept in contact, witnesses testified.

Summerville's attornoy argued for his client to be bound over on second-degree charges, saying there isn't enough evidence to support premeditation.

ine coronant's sister revealed her brother said he may have been raped by Ellis. The two spoke after he was arrested in Minneapelis. "I can't recall if he said he was raped or he almost was raped," said Shirley Summerville during cross-examination by her brother's attorney Cyrille Hall.

Input gathered during the session will be digested by the district's early childhood study committee, with a formal recommendation expected to go to the school board in December, Maxfield said.


