**Health Officer's Ban on Public
Meetings Has Been
Withdrawn**

No new cases of diphtheria are reported and the three patients who were stricken last week are well or nearly so.

VILLAGE BONDS AT 4-1-2 BRING PRE- MIUM OF \$30

**Detroit Broker Also Stands the
Expense of the Printing
of the Bonds**

When the rate of interest on the water bonds was placed at 4 1/2 per cent it was thought by some that the council would experience some difficulty in disposing of them at par. However they were sold to Detroit brokers for a \$30 premium with accrued interest and the buyers to bear all the expense of printing the bonds, etc. The various brokers and banks who bid found fault because the interest was payable annually instead of semi-annually, but the bid accepted goes to show that the credit of Farmington is gilt edged.

As the town owes nothing else, except this issue of bonds, the security is about as good as it could well be and it was enabled to get a low rate of interest.

COUNTY AGENT TAKES CHILDREN

**Finds a Sad Case of Destitution
in Redford Township**

A terrible case of destitution and neglect was uncovered by County Agent Sam Lawrence in Redford township last Saturday and immediate steps were taken to correct the conditions by breaking up the family and placing the children in public homes and hospitals where they could have the necessary care and protection.

Mr. Lawrence discovered the state of affairs when he went to investigate why Joseph Granc, aged 9, ran away from his home which was in the eastern part of the township near Grand River avenue.

The family had only recently moved to that location from Detroit and when the home was visited by the county agent he found a deplorable state of affairs. The father, John Granc, was away husking corn for the farmers and the mother was in the city, but four small children were at home without fire and but very little food. The eldest at home was only eight years old and the youngest a baby of four months. The older children were trying to feed the baby on some condensed milk. Mr. Lawrence induced some women to go to the home and also procured a physician. The mother was also found and she refused to take the boy Joseph, home again because he had run away.

Steps were immediately taken to give the children proper care and some of them are now in the Detention Home in the city while the others are in the hospital. Mr. Lawrence informs this paper that the baby will probably die.

Blue Print Shows Imposing Structure
The blue print shows that the new water works building is to be a rather imposing structure.

Work on the foundation is going forward as fast as practicable and the cement blocks will soon be piling up. The work on the building, the well and the mains will require some weeks time, but whatever is done will be done right so that in the end the town will have a water system that ought to be good for several years or until the town reaches the 3000 population mark.

**TAMMANY LEADER LOSES
NEW YORK STATE**

**Incomplete Returns from the
States Which Held Elections
on Tuesday**

Tuesday's elections show that "Boss" Murphy, the Tammany chieftain was overwhelmingly defeated. While the Tammany ticket has apparently carried New York county, the Republicans have recaptured the assembly and will have a good big working majority in the legislature. The assembly at present is democratic by 24 majority, but the republicans will now have a majority of 36.

Chicago reports that the judicial election in Cook county was about evenly divided between the Republicans and Democrats.

Earl (Republican) was elected mayor of Philadelphia by over 8000 majority.

**William Hodge in "The
Man From Home"**

American plays have grown so lustily during the past few years that each one seems stronger, finer, wittier and more authoritative than the last, but it seems to be the general consensus of opinion that the Tarkington-Wilson play, "The Man From Home," which William Hodge brings to the Garrick Theatre, Detroit, next Monday, is far and away beyond all of the splendid efforts of the American dramatists who have successfully provided outbursts of Americanism for the stage. It is American to core. With both a literary force and a vitality in its heart, a splendid moral courageously pointed and a story rich in humor, delightful in romance, in satire, "The Man From Home" has an intense appeal for every sort of amusement seeker, from the frivolous to the thinker, from the scoffer to the patriot.

The central character in "The Man from Home" is an elongated Indiana lawyer. Kokomo is his home and Daniel Voorhees Pike is his patronymic. He is a kindly droll, shrewd and unassuming old bachelor ambling through life at a lazy gait, but not without a purpose. He has sense and character, understands human nature in whatever guise it may appear, respects the best of it and lets the worst of it trouble him little. He is the guardian of two young people, Horace and Ethel Grauger-Simpson, who have spent the greater number of their years abroad, where they have become saturated with the European idea and grown ashamed of their own country.

Pike goes to Sorrento, Italy, the scene of the entire play to prevent the marriage of his ward to the fair-brained son of an English peer. There he becomes involved in a situation upon which the real action of the play hinges.

William Hodge will be seen in the role of Daniel Voorhees Pike, the Indiana lawyer who smashes into the history of Cressy and Agitcourt. The supporting company includes Helen Harvest, Leonora von Ottinger, Ida Vernon, Arthur Bell, Reelin Gayer, Herbert McKenzie, Anthony Asher and Harold Russell.
