The total number of applications, however, foll just short of last year's record of 2,765, with 2,764 applications received. In addition, a record 1,094 student-athlets will be recognized as addi-tional qualifiers for having met the eligibility criteria for the award, even though they wore not a scholarship honore for their school. All will be presented with certificates commemo-rating their achievenent. Every MHSAA member high achool is allowed to select one student-th-let to represent it in each sport, and an individual may be nominated in more than one sport.

To be eligible for the award, stu-dents must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale), and have previously won a varsity let-ter in the sport which they are apply-ing. Students were also asked to show involvement in other school and com-munity activities, submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word cessay on the importance of sports-manship in educational athletics. The applications will be judged by a 68-momber committee of achool coaches, counselors, faculty members, administrators and board members, administrators and board from MHSAA momber schools. Thalists in all sports will be announced on Jan. 29. Fall sports recipients will be announced on Feb. 10; winter recipients Feb. 17; and apring recipients Feb. 24. The 24 Scholar-Athlete Award recipients will be accomized in a cero mony during halfime of the Class C boys basketball finals Baturday, March 27, at the Breaslin Student Event Center in East Lansing.
