George Tobin wore his Irish heart on his sleeve, living life "to the fullest," all while pulling for Notre Dame in enemy Wolverine

Asked how someone who bled Motre Dame green could happily exist near U-M, Anhut spoke from experience and said "You just roll with the punches."


