Farmington just missed qualifying for state and won 70 percent of its dual meets last year.

Graduation losses were few; however, Kelly Barenie and Marie Law were first team All-Observer selections.

But Farmington returns senior tricaptains Brook Rubin, Anna Clark and Liz Stoler, as well as junior Jamie Miltello and sophomore Lauren Oueltette. Chelsea Keesling is the most promising member of a strong freshman class.

Rubin also was a member of the All-Observer first team. Clark, Stoler and Miltello were second-team selections. "(Barenie and Law) were outstanding competitors, but we're hoping, with our freshmen and just the maturity of the team, we can be where we weef last year," coach Jeff Dwyer said. "Our goal is to make it to state as a team."

Rubin has been a top performer since her freshman year and also leads by example, according to Dwyer. Rubin has been to the batte meet two of the last three years and placed in the all-around competition last season.
