Hills attorney remembered for his compassion

A funeral Mass for Paul W. Harty, a former Farmington Hills attorney, was said Wednesday, Jan. 27, at Our Lady Queen of Mary's Catholic Church in Birmingham with the Rev. Michael Happon officiating. Mr. Harty's general practice firm was known as Harty, Ainslie, Dillon and Pustama. He later practiced with his daughter, Marilyn Harty Thompson, a Mercy High School graduate.

Mr. Harty of Birmingham was a member of the bar for more than 60 years, and didn't retire until last year. He died of a heart attack Jan. 22, at his home before his 62nd birthday in Lexington, Ky., where he was visiting his sister. He was born Jan. 25, 1917, in Strasser, Ill.

Mr. Harty's son-in-law, former Oakland County Prosecutor Richard Thompson, said Paul Harty "had a long and distinguished legal career. He was a courteous and passionate defender of those less fortunate than he. But most of all, I will remember him as deeply religious, and as a loving father and grandfather."

Mr. Harty's brother-in-law, James Dillon of Farmington Hills, said, "For over a year before she died, my mother was bedridden and living at the home of my sister, Kay, and her husband, Paul. Round the clock, nurses

were coming and going. Visitors were constantly coming to see her. Yet Paul was always gracious, rushing out to the kitchen to get people a drink or to dish up some of his delicious sauteed potatoes, or another of his famous snacks. I think that was really something for a son-in-law to open his home like that. I was always so grateful to him."

Mr. Harty was chief usher and a eucharistic minister at Our Lady Queen of Mary's. Each week, he ushered both the Saturday evening Mass and a Sunday Mass.

A 1935 graduate of Detroit's St. Cecilia High School, Mr. Harty won a football scholarship to the Detroit Institute of Technology, where he played quarterback and end. He later received a boxing scholarship to the University of Detroit. Mr. Harty had the highest scholastic average in his class upon graduating from law school. He was president of his senior class, and president and charter member of the Blue Key Honor athletics society.

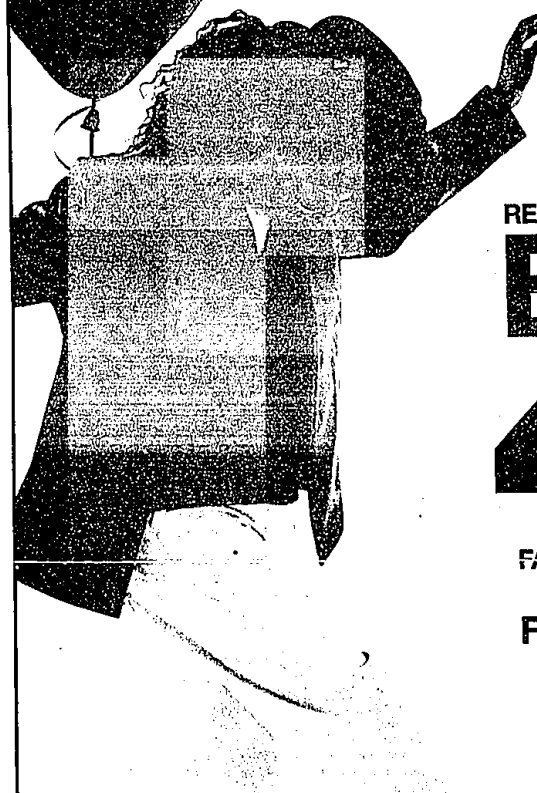
Mr. Harty led an illustrious World War II naval career, receiving the President Unit citation and three battle stars. He served on the escort carrier Lunga Point in the engagements of Leyte, Luzon and Iwo Jima.

Mr. Harty was a member, director and president of the Northwest Bar Association; and a member of the Southfield, Oakland County and state bar associations. He served as director and chairman of the Board of Directors for Wayne County Neighborhood Legal Services. He was one of the first mediators appointed by now-retired Oakland Circuit Judge James Thorburn.

Mr. Harty was a past president, past director, and a life member of Western Golf & Country Club. He also was director and president of the Past Presidents Golf Association, and a member of the Michigan Senior Golf Association.

In addition to his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. Harty is survived by his sister, Mary J. Bass of Lexington; son-in-law Bill Ledoux; grandchildren Bill, Christopher, Jamie, Richard, Matthew and Andrew-Paul; and many nieces and nephews. Preceding him in death were his wife, Mary Catherine, and daughter Carol. Burial was at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield. Arrangements were by A.J. Desmond & Sons Funeral Home.
