The Raiders made 11 of 16 free throws in the second half and were 16-6f-24 at the line overall. Delta sank two of five in the second half and was 9-of-16 for the game.
OCC forward Paula Wesa had gami-high totals of 27 points and 12 rebounds to lead the Lady Raiders, who are 5-3 in the Eastern Conference and 12-5 overall.

Delta is 3-6 in the conference and 7-12 overall; OCC is 3-5 and 8-10.




But the Raiders didn't merely win a dual mest Thursday against visiting Plymouth Salem. They crushed the Rocks by the impressive score of 106-80.

Moore scored 17 of his game-high 33 points in the third quarter to help the Shamrocks erase a 31-29 halftime deficit and beat Borgess in a Catholic Lengue Central Division game, 84-68. Moore made seven of 11 shots in the third quarter, including three from three-point range, and in the fourth quarter he dominated with his passing. On three straight fourth-quarter possessions in the half-court, Moore drove by his defender and made nifty passes
