## PINGREE, THE FIRST INSURGENT

No matter whether we follow Governor Wilson of New Jersey as progressive democrats, or whether we follow Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin as insurgent republican, or whether we are old line democrats or Taft republicans, or what not, the interest in the work of the late Hazen S. Pingree as mayor of Detroit and governor of Michigan increases as the years that pass.
