Life isn't the movies: Internet dalliances can have sad outcomes

For every story portrayed by Tom Hanks and Meg Ryan in "You've Got Mail," there are sad consequences of people believing they've found a soul mate only to have that hope evaporate after meeting the person for the first time.

The denth of a 28-year-old French woman whose body was found in Farmington Hills March 3, in woods outside of the apartment of the man who rejected her, tragically underscores such outcomes, a University of Michigan psychology professors said. Police rule Julie Yasa's death as suspicious, though sleeping capsules were found underneath her body. Authorities are awaiting to taclology reports before making a final determination. "It's as ad," said Deborah Greer, a University of Michigan psychology professor and private therapist. "She obviously wasn't stable. She was pinning God only knows what kinds of hopes on a relationship with this gentleman." According to police, the man broke off their infair after one night together in which they had sex.
