Farmington secures berth in state meet

After years of near-miss frustration and months of anticipation, Farmingtons gymnastics team was equal to the task this time. Farmington achieved its season-long goal Saturday when it qualified for the state championships by finishing among the top three teams in the Hartland regional.

"You would've thought we won the meet by the reaction (of the Farmington girls) to coming in third," coach Jeff Dwyer said. "It's amething we've been fighting for the last three years."

Farmington had been fourth in the regional, just missing a borth in the state meet, each of the last three years. Brighton edged Farmington by nine tenths of a point for third place a year ago.

"With that situation occurring three years in a row, for the girls who've been on the team that long," Dwyer said, "that was their goal every year—'OK, we're going to get back there and make it to state."

Furthermore, Farmington accomplished the feat while competing in

what was arguably the most difficult of the four regionals. Some first-place teams in other regionals would not have qualified based on their scores if they had been at Hartland.

Finishing ahead of Farmington were the state's top two teams, one of which is favored to win the state championship.

Brighton edged Hartland to win the regional title, 145.25 to 145.20. Farmington earned the highest score ever for a Farmington team (141.3) while arrowly getting the nod this time over Holt (141.3).

"After the bus ride home the last three years, I don't know if I could have taken another one," Dwyrs said. "When you just miss out, it can be pretty heartbreaking.
