### December Circuit Court Cases

From the Pontiac Press Gazette we learn that Mrs. Dare Perry is the only woman who will be arraigned when the December term of the circuit court opens December 4. The other ten criminal cases which will appear on the December calendar are all against men. Larceny is the charge set opposite the names of five of the respondents. Only one of the other charges is serious. The other offenses are: Assault with intent to do great bodily harm, desertion, a statutory offense, resisting an officer, violation of the liquor law, and an appeal from the decision of the justice court.

Prosecutor Pelton has handed in his list of criminal cases for the December calendar of the circuit court and they are as follows: Sidney Mara, larceny; Harry Silver, larceny; Henry Szyrowsky, assault with intent to do great bodily harm; Mary Perry, larceny; Hugh Brennan, serious offense; William Dunston, desertion; Wm. Seaton, larceny; Paul Cottal, larceny; Patrick McCarthy, resisting an officer; Frank Ingersoll, an appeal from the justice court, and John W. Birch, violation of the liquor law. Several more cases may be added to the list before the December term of court opens.
