Raiders' Zald earns all-state honors

Senior Matt Zald became the first North Farmington swimmer since Jon Kershaw to score in

Kershaw to score in two events at the Class A boys state championship meet Saturday.

coach Pat Duthie said. "I think it's quite an accomplishment. There aren't quite an accomplishment. There aren't a lot who score, let alone score in two

"I was real pleased with what he did. He's not real happy, because he believes he could have gene faster in the 50. With more background, I have no doubt he could be faster in the 100." Zald, who was undefeated in dual meets in the 50 and was the Oakland County champion, swam 21.63 in the finals but went 21.54 in the prelims Friday.

"The place was not a big deal to him,"
Duthic said, "but his time expectations
were a little faster than what he swam.
"He didn't have a good start in the

prelims. The block seemed to rock back on him, and his foot was a little high on the wall (at the turn). Consequently, he went a little deeper on the push-off.

Nonetheless, Zald's prelim time broke his own school record and qualifies for All-America consideration.

Zald also swam his best time (47.64) in the finals of the 100 freestyle improving on his prelim time of 47.65. Kershaw was a double state champion for the Raiders in 1994, winning the 200 and 100 freestyle titles.

Zald made great strides since last season, according to Duthic, when he qualified for state in the same events but didn't score. Zald's best times a year ago were 21.88 in the 60 and 49.10 in the 100.

Furthermore, he didn't train during the summer while he was gone on a

family trip to Australia.

"He's done this in 12 to 13 weeks of training (since the start of the season),"
Duthic said. "He has a lot of natural

Farmington 6th in team competition

Consistency was the hallmark of the farmington gymnastics team throughout the 1999 season, including its final performance in the state meet. Farmington fell short of matching its best score but still finished sixth in the 12-team competition Friday at Hartland High School. The host Eagles won the state title with a 144.75 score, edging Western Lakes Activities Association champion Brighton, which scored 144.45. Formington was better than six other teams with a 138.8 team total.

"If you look at the teams that were there, if we would've had a perfect meet, I don't know if we could've been much higher." Farmington coach Jeff Dwyer said. "Those teams had some pretty good gymnasts.

The thing I like about our team is we had one Division 1, and we showed you can be pretty tough in high school without having to be in a club. I'm quite proud of the girls.

If Farmington had equaled its best score of 141.8 that it scored at the regional meet, the team would have moved up two places ahead of Fortage Northern (141.6) and Rochester Adams (141.4) to finish fourth behind third-place Rochester (141.85).

You can always think What iff and that will drive you crazy, Dwyer said, adding the judging was a little different.

"We had a very solid meet: I was happy with the outcome. If we had a bad event here or there, you could say we could've done this or that, but we had a good meet.

"Everyone came away with a good feeling. We reached our goal; we made it to state. When we got there, we said Let's see how high we can place." We beat out six very good teams. These

were 12 teams from the entire state, and we were better than half of them. I feel great about that."
Farmington's top individual scorers in team competition were, on bars: freshman Chelsea Keesling 9.05, senior Brook Rubin 8.85, sophomore Laureo Ouellette 8.25 and senior Anna Clark 7.8.

Junior Jamie Militello led the way on balance beam with n 9.05; Keesling scored 8.9, Clark 8.4 and freshman Kristin Ulewicz 8.25.

Keesling received a 9.25 on floor exercise, Militello 8.85, Rubin 8.7 and Ulewicz 8.65. Ulewicz had the best vault score at 9.15; Ouellette had an 8.65, Clark 8.6 and Rubin 8.4.

"I don't think we had any real outstanding scores, but as long as we kept posting high 8s on each event we were going to score between 138 and 140." Dwyer said. "We've been so consistent in that range except for one meet.

"This was one of our better competitive teams. The girls were hungry this year. They had that attitude; they men't scared when they got to region."
