"We need to reitorate that we reduced the amount we sold by \$7.7 million" from original pro-jections, ahe added. That final bond sale summary totals \$85.4 mil-lion (including \$67.1 million in "Sories I" bonds, sold in October 1997 to ABN AMRO Chicage Corp.), at a combined interest rate of 4.6 percent. The original two-part bond issue of \$93.1 mil-

lion, approved in September 1997, was reduced by \$7.7 million when the board allocated proceeds from the Durant lawauit settlement. Those boards will be used for renovations and other improvements to school district buildings. At the time the board issue was approved, the projected interest rate was more than 6.2 percent. Cannon exid the owner of a home valued at \$165,000 is expected to save an average of nearly \$26 per year over the 20-year life expectancy of the bond issue. It will actually take 20 years, six months to pay off the bonds, although the lesser "Series I" will be paid off in just 10 years, one month. Also in the final aummary, total interest costs-for both series combined were estimated at \$47.2 million, compared to the originally foreensted \$84.2 million. The 20-year average tax rate of 1.65 mills is less than the original projection of 1.96 mills.
