Todd was once asked for a clue as to when ball needs to be resurfaced.

"If you have a high performance realn ball and you are gatting out of the ball good, but it is not carrying over two or three weeks in a row, that tells you to get insurfaced at the pro shop.

Todd cautions anyone against the Mark Martin method of putting the ball in the even to healt it and sweet out the foll. This is can be very damaging to the chomicals used to manufacture the ball. 
