Other times, the large B-29 reconnaissance planes were involved in
accidents causing injuries which
necessitated his medical attention.
After he returned to civilian life, he
began his radiology training at
Eloise Hospital (later renamed

He became certified as a radiologist by the Specialty Board of Radiology. He was offered and accepted
the position of Head of the Radiology Department at Wayne County
General Hospital, and the Universitty of Michigan appointed him associate professor of radiology.
He trained residents, who also
became board-certified radiologists.
After 20 years of service, he retired
from the hospital and joined his
brother in the private practice of
radiology, servicing the communities of Farmington, Livonia,
Northville, Plymouth and Garden
City, He fully retired in 1985.
