

Whalers gain important victory over Knights, 7-3



Following two overtime losses, the Plymouth Whalers avoided going down three games to none in their Ontario Hockey League playoff series with the London Knights by winning Game 3 Wednesday night in Plymouth, 7-3.

The final score indicates a lopsided, cruise-control, that's-more-like-it kind of game: Plymouth Whalers 7, London Knights 3.

Don't believe it Whalers' coach Pete

Don't believe it. Whalers' coach Pete DeBoer doesn't.

"They're a hard-working team," DeBoer said of London after his Whalers scored three times in the last 3:21 to turn a close home game into a rout. "We only scored two goals in each of the first two games, and that's uncharacteristic of us. We kept the pressure on them (tonight) and finally got some to go in."

The win narrows Plymouth's deficit in games to 2-1. The two teams meet again at 7:30 p.m. Friday in London,

followed by a 7:30 p.m. game Saturday at Compuware Arena.

Adam Colagiacomo and Harold Druken scored two goals apiece to pace the offense, and goalie Robert Holsinger made three superb stops in the first period to keep the Whalers in front

the tirst period to keep the whaters in front.

But they were never in complete control and unable to pull away from the peaky Knights until Colagiacome intercepted an errant pass deep in London's end late in the game. He skated in or goalia Gene Chiarello, swerving left and knocking the puck past him to put Plymouth up 5-3 with 3-21 left.
