Farmington Hills city officials said they would miss Compuware, which has been ir the city more than 16 years if they left. But they would have no problem filling the void, said Stove Brock, city manager.

"It isn't a done deal just yet, though it looks like they're moving in that direction," Brock said. Word like them to maintain a presence in Farmington Hills if they are moving. I certainly wish them luck if they are departing." Compuware's present space at a 31400 Northwestern Highway would likely not be vacant long, Brock said.

"Wo'd have no trouble filling that space with an equally premiere tenant," he said. Compuware is a relatively amall taxpucer, providing less than 1 percent of the city's ax buse annually, Brock added.

Farmington Hills meyor Aldo Vagnozzi said he was disappointed about the lack of communication between the company and the city.

"I regret never having the chance to meet with (Compuware) face to face to discuss their staying here," Vagnozzi said Friday. "We had been trying to get a meeting with (Compuware Chairman Petor Karmanos Jr.) but it just didn't come about."

Vagnozzi agroed that the space probably wouldn't be vacant long.
"That is a very choice location. The way it's laid out, it would be ideal for another computer firm. Our whole city is geared toward technology."
Compuware Chairman and CEO Peter Karmanes Jr. said the plan would help support Detroit's business growth and allow Compuware to expand.
"Compuware would like to move forward with this comprehensive plan to support growth in the city of Detroit as it meets its own business growth requirents, said Karmanos.
"Our expectation is that if parties can move expeditiously to finalize this deal, Compuware would—in a relatively short time period—anneunce a commitment to move its corporate

headquarters to Campus Marneaquarters to Campus Mar-tius and construct a second building on the riverfront east of the Renaissance Conter. The riverfront location would house Compuware's automotive and health care businesses, a tech-


Compuware's automotive and health care businesses, a technology conference center, and day care and itiness facilities operated in conjunction with General Motors."

Detroit Mayor Dennis Archer said Compuware would benefit from a large city setting.


