some are more aggressive than others and some are a lot more

Even with these high powered balls, you have to be strong

Many of these are pretty tune-able as well because you can pol-

ish them or sand them dull. It all depends on the lane conditions, which will ultimately dictate what you will throw. The Pro-Activus are able to hook early, even in oil, get down the lane well and still be strong at the back end, but you would not want it on a dry lane condition. If you prefer a ball that will go long and finish hard at the back end, then a pearlized reactive resin or highly polished reactive will do the job.

Best advice of all, see the proshop operator, they keep up on all the latest developments and will steep you in the right directions.
