


Hello: James Seavitte (at right) spearheaded efforts to raise money for the expanded recreation center. He meets Jim Ragland and board member Myra Wetzel.

Boys and Girls Republic honors former leader with party

It was pure celebration.

Donors of the expanded Jack McElroy
Recreation Center at Boys and Girls Republic
on Nine Mile were treated to a party and
brief dedication surrounded by the sounds of

The \$1.5 million addition to the recreation center on the campus was due to denations from individuals, corporations and founda-tions.

The center is named after the late Jack McElroy, the former assistant director, who was dedicated to children, Peck said. "Besides its providing a healthy physical

outlet, Jack saw recreation as a tool to help youth who were not physically fit get in shape which increased their self-esteem. He taught staff now to create and ovaluate recreation plans for each young person, tailoring games and sports to ach youth's specific needs. He taught young people to use recreation as a way to look at and deal with the conflicts in their lives," according to a tribute. McElroy was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor in March 1991, He died in January 1994, "He became a leader dedicated to kids," Peck added.

The addition of girls to the program and expanded services to youth and families prompted the expansion of the recreation enter.

The expanded center offers a weight room, library, multipurpose room, offices and bathrooms, Peck said.
